Dr. Monique M. Ingalls is Director of Research and Graduate Programs at the Dunn Center for Christian Music Studies at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, USA. Her numerous books and articles focus on present-day Christian congregational and choral music-making, addressing themes such as worship music in global Pentecostalism, online religious music practices, musical localization within world Christianities, and Black British gospel music. She is co-founder of the biennial "Christian Congregational Music: Local and Global Perspectives" conference and serves as senior editor of the Congregational Music Studies Book Series with Routledge Press.

THE PANELISTS



Prof. Bode Omojola is the Hammond-Douglass Five College Professor of Music. As a Five College Professor, he holds a joint appointment with all five institutions of the Five College Consortium: Amherst, Hampshire, Mount Holyoke and Smith Colleges, and the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, USA. Omojola received his Ph.D. from the University of Leicester, England, and taught previously at Northeastern University in Boston, USA. His music research ranges from indigenous to contemporary African traditions, including post-colonial African art music. Omojola has held prestigious academic awards, including the Harvard University Radcliffe Fellowship in Musicology and the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation Fellowship.



Prof. Kayode Samuel is Professor of musicology and musical arts educator; Head of African Musicology Unit at the Institute of African Studies, University of Ibadan, Nigeria. His research interests include theory, practice and pedagogy of the musical arts, indigenous and modern African music traditions. A distinguished recipient of the Postdoctoral Fellowship for the African Humanities Program (AHP), awarded by the American Council of Learned Societies, Kayode Samuel is a member of numerous professional bodies, including the Association of Nigerian Musicologists (ANIM), Society of Music Educator of Nigeria (SOMEN), Pan African Society for Musical Arts Education (PASMAE) and International Society for Music Education (ISME). He was a visiting scholar at the Institute of African Studies, University of Bayreuth, Germany between October and November 2024.



Mr. Sibusiso Njeza, born on March 17, 1982, in Butterworth, Eastern Cape, South Africa. Njeza is a choir conductor, teacher, composer, and arts administrator with over 20 years of experience. He has composed three operas: Madiba the African Opera (2013), Blood of Mine (2015), and Amagokra (2021), addressing themes such as South African history and gender-based violence. Njeza has also written choral works and art songs performed both locally and internationally. He currently lectures in the Department of Music and Musicology at Rhodes University in Makhanda. His contributions to the arts are noted both in South Africa and abroad.
